## Bonanza Kennel Club General Meeting Minutes

June 1, 2021

Meeting called to order by President Candy Roper at 7:03 p.m.

Motion Yvonne Roscoe, second Vikki Jaramillo to approve May 2021 minutes as printed in the May newsletter. Motion passed unanimously.

### **Secretary reports:**

No Corresponding or Recording Secretary reports.

### **Treasurer report:**

Lexine Thompson reported the beginning balance was \$33,240.47 with expenses of \$121.06 for an ending balance of \$33,119.41.

We received a donation of \$221.34 from Eagle Valley Dog Tracking Club. They closed their club and gave us the balance left in their account.

### **Committees**

#### **Show Committee:**

Candy said we are ready to start taking judges names for next year's show. Rick Berger said we have three so far, Shalisa Neeley, Kathy Carter, and can't remember who the other judge is right now! Rick said we lost three judges for this year's show as well as one that resigned from judging. Candy said any suggestions for next year are welcome. Jennifer Moxley suggested Phil Freilich, Julie Felton, Eva Berg, Bergit Coady-Kabel and Judith Brown. Anne Katona was also mentioned. Candy said the more groups the judge does the better.

Candy has talked to the Parks Department a couple times. We can use the bathrooms if we hire a janitorial service which was our plan anyway. We cannot park in the arena for overflow. The show will be limited to 1200 entries because of limited parking. The first draft for the premium has gone to MB-F. We are good for now.

CGC will be from 10:00-2:00, held during the conformation show. It takes about 10-12 minutes per dog so Thea said we need to have enough time for people who haven't pre-registered. There will be CGC, CGCA and Trick Dog. It will be set up in front of the gazebo. Candy will ask the parking or grounds person to mark it off and make sure there is enough room. Thea is looking to get some signage done.

Premium will be available on InfoDog or you can ask MB-F to mail you a hard copy.

Vikki said that in regards to trophies there are two breeds-Sloughi and Entlebucher Mountain Dog-that were not listed in the premium list because at the time she didn't know they would be here. Candy said they can still be added in the premium. With limiting the entry, MB-F will post the premium on August 16 and entries will be accepted at 9 a.m. PT August 19.

#### **Match Committee:**

Nothing new on the match. Candy has not spoken with Elaine lately and has not yet received written approval from AKC. Make sure to mark July 31<sup>st</sup> on our calendars so we have plenty of help. We usually start judging at 10 but need people there by 8 to get things going. We need time to sign up day of match entries. Cindy Craig said we should have at least 2 hours for set-up. She suggested if we are having CGC and trick dog it could be done while getting the match set up. Candy said we will offer pre-registration online for people to prepay which may help. We don't know who the judges are yet.

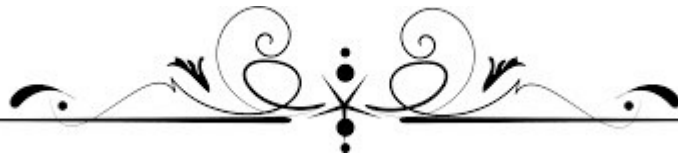

**Scientists Have A New Way to Calculate A Dog's Age**

(Science Magazine) Scientists have gained new insight into the epigenetic clock that controls how dogs age and have devised a new formula to pinpoint exactly how old that good boy or girl in your life is. Whether you have a pitbull, pug, or Pembroke Welsh corgi, your pup will reach puberty at around 10 months and will likely die before turning 20. Scientists have long known that dogs are susceptible to many of the same age-related diseases that we are, such as cancer, arthritis and heart disease. The researchers also devised a new way to calculate a dog's age, but it's arguably more complicated than simply multiplying by seven. To calculate the age, you'll have to multiply the natural logarithm of your pup's age by 16 and then add 31. Here's the equation:  $16 \times \ln(\text{your dog's age in human years}) + 31$ . If you're wondering why your 2-year-old dog clocks in at around 40 human years, it's because his epigenetic clock ticks a bit faster than yours, but slows down as he ages. Here's the scale:

1 = 31 years	9 = 66.2
2 = 42.1	10 = 67.8
3 = 48.6	11 = 69.4
4 = 53.2	12 = 70.8
5 = 56.8	13 = 72.0
6 = 59.7	14 = 73.2
7 = 62.1	15 = 74.3
8 = 64.3	



## Importation of Dogs from AKC

Last week, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced the temporary suspension of the importation of dogs from countries classified as high risk for canine rabies, or of those arriving from countries not considered a high risk if the dogs have been in a high risk country during the previous six months. However, new reports indicate that another actual importation of an infected dog may have triggered CDC's action. The new report adds to three other cases of rabid dogs being imported into the U.S. in recent years.

Earlier this month, a dog imported by an animal rescue organization from Azerbaijan to the United States tested positive for rabies. The dog was one of 34 animals that was part of a shipment to O'Hare International Airport in Chicago on June 10. The dog had ultimately been placed with a family in Chester County, Pennsylvania, before symptoms had become apparent and the dog was tested and later euthanized.

The animals were not in the main cabin of the plane they traveled by or in the main terminal of the airport. While travelers through O'Hare are not considered to be at risk, at least 12 people are known to have been exposed to the dog. Health officials in Illinois, Indiana, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania are collaborating with federal agencies to track down the new owners of the other imported pets to see if other animals in the shipment have been infected.

The CDC estimates that approximately 1 million dogs are imported into the U.S. annually, of which 100,000 dogs are from countries at high-risk of canine rabies variant virus (CRVV). In its formal announcement, CDC cited the temporary limitation as a step needed to protect the public health against the reintroduction of canine variant rabies into the United States, particularly while public health resources at the Federal, state, and local levels have become limited due to the global effort to eradicate COVID-19, including CDC's agency-wide effort.

The U.S. was declared rabies-free for canine variant rabies in 2007. CDC reports that the importation of just one dog infected with CRVV risks re-introduction of the virus into the U.S., and results in increased risks to public health, potential loss of human and animal life, and subsequent monetary costs. The CDC estimates the public health investigations and subsequent cost of care for people exposed to rabid dogs to cost between \$215,000 and \$509,000 per importation event. In one 2019 case, the importation of a single dog with rabies cost more than \$400,000 for the public health investigations and rabies post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) of exposed persons.

Rabies virus is primarily transmitted through direct contact (such as through broken skin or mucous membranes in the eyes, nose, or mouth) with saliva or brain/nervous system tissue from an infected animal, and infects the central nervous system. In the U.S., rabies is mostly found in wild animals like bats, raccoons, skunks, and foxes. However, in many other countries dogs still carry rabies, and most rabies deaths in people around the world are caused by dog bites. If a person becomes infected and does not receive the appropriate medical care after a potential rabies exposure, the virus can cause disease in the brain, ultimately resulting in death.

The American Kennel Club (AKC) supports the selective and responsible importation of adequately vaccinated dogs from overseas, but also recognizes the grave health threat that the import of unhealthy dogs presents to US populations. In an earlier post, Sheila Goffe, Vice President, Government Relations for AKC, noted, "We realize this temporary ban may present some short-term inconveniences to responsible breeders and exhibitors; however we appreciate and strongly support the CDC's leadership in taking a firm strong approach to protect the long term health of U.S. pet and public health. We hope the temporary ban can soon be replaced by a more nuanced approach that requires improved health reporting for all dogs imported into the US but allows for importing healthy dogs from a wide variety of countries."

AKC, along with the American Veterinary Medical Association, National Animal Interest Alliance, and other animal organizations strongly support the Healthy Dog Importation Act, which would require that all imported canine be free of infection, adequately vaccinated and/or protected against contagious diseases, present a health certificate from a U.S. approved veterinary authority, and have permanent identification such as a microchip. AKC looks forward to reintroduction of the Healthy Dog Importation Act in the near future.

## Pet first aid kit items to have on summer adventures

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** We do **NOT** support the policies of Best Friends. However, this list is useful.

A pet first aid kit is a good idea to have if you plan on going on adventures with your dog this summer.

But what should go into a pet first aid kit, exactly?

Mostly, the same stuff that would go into a human first aid kit, but just in case, [Best Friends Animal Society](#) has some tips to know what to pack.

Todd Fleming takes full advantage of the plethora of outdoor sports that the Utah landscape offers, which includes rock climbing, mountain biking, camping, and snowshoeing.

But it was on a kayaking trip with Todd's brother-in-law Ben that they discovered the importance of having a pet first aid kit as part of their adventure gear.

*Do you know what to pack into a pet first aid kit?*

Todd's five-year-old [Rottweiler](#) mix Jasper was playing in the water when somehow his front paw was injured and started bleeding profusely.

Thankfully, Ben created a bandage to slow down the bleeding during their 45-minute drive to the nearest emergency vet clinic, and Jasper is doing fine now.

However, as Best Friends veterinarian Dr. Michelle Lugones says, situations like this emphasize the importance of a pet first aid kit.

"It's important to have a pet first aid kit and know some basic skills because your pet could need first aid at any time, including when you least expect it," Dr. Lugones said in a press release.

"During COVID it's especially important because sometimes it's not as easy to get supplies at the local store as it was before the pandemic. Veterinary care is still available and emergency rooms are up and running, but it's always wise to have some first aid supplies in case you aren't close to an emergency room. That way you have the ability to say, cover an open wound before you transport your pet to an emergency clinic."

Best Friends suggests that the following items be included:

- Book on pet first aid
- Emergency contact info for your veterinarian, an emergency vet hospital, and a poison control hotline
- Prescription medications, if your pet needs them
- Self-adherent bandages
- Gauze roll
- Sterile gauze pads, in several sizes if possible
- Ace bandage wraps
- Anti-bacterial cream (like Neosporin)
- Emergency blanket
- Tweezers
- Blunt scissors
- Doctor exam gloves
- Blood clotting powder
- 10 ml sterile saline syringes
- Hydrogen peroxide (3 percent)
- Cotton balls and/or cotton swabs
- Headlamp and/or flashlight
- Muzzle (animals in pain are more likely to bite out of instinct)
- Sling for hauling medium or large dogs
- Collapsible water bowl
