Minutes of the General Membership Meeting
May 7, 2019

Meeting called to order by President, Candy Roper, at 7:10 PM.

Sieg Goepner made a motion, second Marian Panter, to accept the minutes of the previous meeting as printed in the newsletter. Motion passed unanimously.

There were no secretary reports. Candy checked the P. O. Box, there was no mail.

The Treasurer, Lexine Thompson, is absent. She provided a report to Candy. We had a beginning balance of \$28,846.66. There were expenses for domain registration renewal for the club website and our monthly website fee. There was income from membership dues / donations. The ending balance is \$28,626.16.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grounds Committee - Grounds Chairman, Sieg Goepner, is making our yearly park and meeting room reservations. He asked if we are going to have a July BBQ the Saturday after the 4th. After discussion, it was decided that our July meeting will be the first Tuesday (as usual), July 2, and we will have a BBQ at Fuji Park for the August 6 meeting. Sieg will get the reservations taken care of.

Show Committee – Show Chairman, Candy Roper, is working on the premium list. Warren and Vicky Cook sent new wording for the photographer information. The wording reads “only the Official Photographers may take win and / or action photos, including cell phone pictures at this show.” Discussion followed regarding cell phone pictures. This will be nearly impossible to enforce. Candy has looked at premiums from other clubs and found the standard wording is “Only the Official Photographers may take win photos.” She did find two that said “Only the Official Photographers may take win, action & candid pictures.” If we include cell phone pictures in our premium and have a problem, we could be forced to have a bench. Because this is such a tough item to enforce, the club does not want cell phones included. Nobody should be allowed to shoot over Warren and Vicky’s shoulder when they are setting up and taking win photos. No one else should be allowed in the ring taking pictures while win photos are being taken. Tony suggested we use something like: Only Official Show Photographers are authorized to take official show presentation award photographs in the ring(s) or at Official Show Staging/Award Photograph area(s). Candy will work it out with Warren & Vicky.

Candy said that currently the classes we offer at our shows are Puppy 6-9, Puppy 9-12, Puppy 12-18, Bred By Exhibitor, American Bred, Open, and Winners. We do not offer Novice or Amateur Owner Handler. Do we need to add either of those? Everybody agreed that we are good as is. We need to make sure that Veterans is included.

Discussion about entry fees. With our entry down 150 last year, we barely survived. Candy has done some checking, and the average entry fee starts at \$30.00 She only found one show that offered \$29.00 entries. We currently charge \$27.00 for the first entry and \$20.00 for a second entry. After discussion, Sieg Goepner made a motion, second Tony Yarbrough, that we raise our fee to \$30.00 for the first entry and \$25.00 for the second entry. Motion passed unanimously. Discussion followed about RV parking fees. Candy thinks our fee is currently \$30.00. Motion Tony Yarbrough, second Marian Panter, to raise RV parking \$5.00. Motion passed unanimously.

We’re working on the trophy list for premium. Vikki Jaramillo & Yvonne Roscoe have generously donated a long list of trophies. This will increase the premium size and put us over the 20 pages in our contract. We have two options. One is print it in full. Extra pages in the premium are \$75.00 per page, done in increments of four. The additional cost would be \$300.00. The second option is to do a condensed premium. This would not list any trophies. It would say “for a list of trophies contact MB-F” and they would send it only to people asking. We could publish the list on facebook and on our website to help get it out, but it wouldn’t be in the premium. The cost of this would be \$35.00 per page in increments of four, for a cost of \$140.00. After discussion, Tony Yarbrough made a motion, second Sieg Goepner, to use a condensed premium. More discussion followed. Marian Panter asked if someone donated \$300.00 could we print the full trophy list. The answer is yes. Marian donated \$300.00 to cover the cost. Thank You very much Marian! The motion was withdrawn.

Discussion about food for our workers this fall. Candy has talked to Terri Jones. She is not available. Candy knows someone who is moving back to Carson who cooks at schools. She may be interested in doing it for us. Candy will ask for a proposal. We can also ask the high school.

Legislative Committee - Legislative Liaison, Tony Yarbrough, said there were five bills he has watched this year. He had no major concern with any of them. They included allowing a pet in rental properties and better defining service animals. Nobody raised concern about any of the bills when Tony sent the information out.

Unfinished Business - Candy said Lex has found a good work around for the problem she was having with Bank of America so she has decided to leave our account there instead of moving it. Bank of America is now back in the building and not operating out of the big red truck.

New Business - Jane Myers responded to our April newsletter minutes. We had written that anyone in good standing with AKC could judge extra attractions. Jane told Candy that "Owner Handled groups must be judged by someone approved for at least 1 breed in the group. If a judge has 1 complete group they can get any owner handled group. Puppy, Bred By Exhibitor and veteran groups can be judged by anyone in good standing." Jane sent Candy a flyer on who can judge. It will be in the next newsletter. [\[See page 8\]](#)

There was a question about us holding a raffle at the shows. Candy said that Paws Up for Vets holds a raffle every year to raise money for service dogs. We have told the specialty clubs their raffles cannot extend beyond their Friday specialty so we don't take money away from the service dog raffle, so we shouldn't have a raffle that conflicts either.

Motion Carolyn Goepner, second Judy Davis, to reimburse Tony Yarbrough \$600.00 for legislative expenses as we have done in the past. Discussion followed. Tony said at this late point in the session there's not much left and \$600.00 is too much. Motion withdrawn. Motion Judy Davis that we give Tony a \$100.00 gift card for legislative expenses. Discussion followed that a gift card isn't the best way for Tony. Motion withdrawn. Motion Judy Davis, second Vikki Jaramillo, to give Tony a \$100.00 check for legislative expenses. Motion passed unanimously. Tony thanked the club for the assistance.

Motion to adjourn Carolyn Goepner. Meeting adjourned at 7:58 p.m.

US Service Animals - Miniature Horses As Service Animals | What Can They Do?

Although the majority of service animals are dogs, there is a small proportion that can now be miniature horses. The American's with Disability Act (2010) revised regulations and allows miniature horses to be individually trained to work and perform tasks for a person with disabilities.

A service animal is defined as an animal that 'is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability'. In 2011, the only animal recognized as a service animal was a dog. However recently the laws have changed to allow miniature horses to be trained to work and perform tasks for someone with a disability. These are new and separate provisions from the ADA which allows both service dogs and service miniature horses to be recognized as service animals and support a disabled person.

Under the American's with Disabilities Act, the new regulations state that places and policies that are already in place must now permit miniature horses, where reasonable, to be treated the same as dogs.

The miniature horses should be 24 inches to 34 inches in height and weight around 70 to 100 pounds. There are four regulations provided by the ADA which work as assessment factors to determine where a miniature horse can enter a facility:

- * Whether the miniature horse is housebroken
- * If the miniature horse is under control
- * If the facility can accommodate the miniature horse's size, weight, and type
- * Whether the miniature horse will not compromise safety requirements for safe operation for the whole of the facility and other members of the public.

As miniature horses are much bigger than dogs, they have to follow more regulations to ensure they are providing a safe service to their owner as well as the people around them.

What Can They Do?

Service horses will be trained and work just like service dogs. Miniature horses are best known for providing a service as a guide animal where they help guide someone who is blind or has visual impairments. They also work well as an emotional support. They are less common as a service animal but it has recently become law that both dogs and horses only can be working service animals. As they provide excellent assistance as guide horses, they have the ability to keep their owner safe thus providing safe support as a service animal.

All service animals must be trained to a high level but they should also possess very good behavior and ability to be under excellent control before they are considered. They have to meet the needs of their individual owner, working to their individual needs and disability. Just like all service animals, service horses will respond to their user, pick up dropped items and medication and support them in public places, helping them live a more independent life.

Training a miniature horse is very extensive and more intense than training a service dog because horses are often easily spooked. They need to become desensitized to these situations by working calming through distractions. This is to ensure they will not become spooked in a social situation and become unsupportive to their owner. Because of this, a lot of hours are needed to help train horses and adapt them to the house, tasks, and environment for the owner to be comfortable.

Benefits of a Service Horse

There are many benefits of having a service horse and some often prefer a service horse over a service dog. Firstly, horses live a long time (up to 35) and can work for 20 or so years which provides support to their owner for a long time. Miniature horses are a great size to support someone with a disability that impairs their mobility. Because they are at the hip height and have a strong, well-built body, service horses are an ideal size for someone who is struggling with their mobility and often loses their balance.

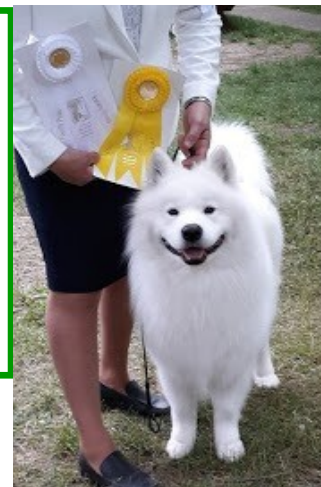
Miniature horses are very easy to groom and don't shed or trigger allergies like dogs often do. They also can't get fleas like dogs, a great benefit of having a service horse over a service dog. This means a service horse would be more suited to someone who is very sensitive to hair and has severe allergies or hayfever.

Dogs are very social and hyper animals and although they are trained extensively so that they are calm when working, they still have a big social drive. Miniature horses, however, do not have the social drive which means they will happily stand quietly for a long time whilst working and out in public, without making a sound. Mini horses are also house trained very easily and only require a call amount of outdoor space so adapting them to the owner's home should not be a problem. Some religions do not allow people to work with dogs so a miniature horse is an excellent alternative to this.

*Approved includes both permit and full status judges. ***Exhibit* refers to any dog personally handled by the individual OR any dog owned or co-owned by the individual. Restrictions apply to all members of the same household.

THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB LAUNCHES AKC CERTIFIED EXPORT PEDIGREES

Document to aide owners in foreign kennel club registrations

New York, NY - The American Kennel club has launched the AKC Certified Export Pedigree. The document contains all of the information required to obtain registration with foreign kennel clubs.

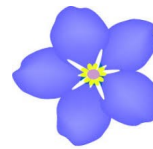
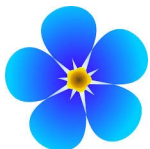
The AKC Certified Export Pedigree merges the information found on the AKC 3-Generation Certified Pedigree and the AKC Registration Certificate, including the name(s) of the current owner(s) and the address of the primary dog owner. It includes the date of the last transfer of the dog's ownership. But the unique registration certificate issue date is not included to protect AKC breeders, owners and the AKC Stud Book.

The document is designed to minimize confusion and make it safer and easier to register dogs abroad, which can prove especially helpful for exhibitors who show their dogs in other countries and breeders who sell their dogs overseas. Before the AKC Certified Export Pedigree, owners had to send the foreign kennel club their certificate of ownership and a three-generation pedigree. The AKC Certified Export Pedigree eliminates the need for that process and discourages fraud.

AKC Executive Secretary Gina DiNardo, who oversees AKC's relationships with foreign kennel clubs, said, "Most foreign registries produce export pedigrees so the AKC is now more in line with what other registries in the world are doing and simplifying the process for our customers helps prevent confusion, delays and errors."

The AKC has reciprocal agreements with more than 200 foreign kennel clubs. To register an American-born, AKC-recognized breed with one of these registries, the dog first must be registered with the American Kennel Club and the owner must provide proof of this to the foreign organization.

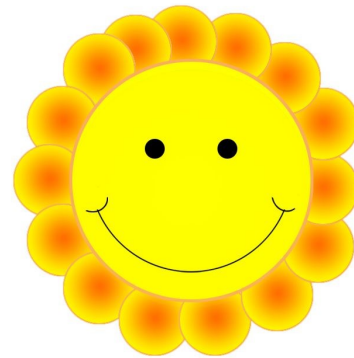
